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Mike Royden – short biography

Mike Royden has been a teacher and lecturer for over 30 years. He studied History and Archaeology and the University of Liverpool. He has taught History, Politics and Information Technology in Wirral schools since 1992, and has also lectured for many years in Local History on Adult Education Degree courses in University of Liverpool Centre for Continuing Education.

He has researched and written about various aspects of History for over thirty-five years and publications include,

- *Merseyside at War 1939-45*
- *Tales from the 'Pool – a collection of Liverpool Stories*
- *Tracing Your Liverpool Ancestors*
- *Pioneers and Perseverance: A History of the Royal School for the Blind, Liverpool 1791-1991*

He has contributed entries to the *Oxford Dictionary of National Biography* and numerous Historical Academic Journals. He has written a variety of articles for various websites and has designed and maintains ten history websites at www.roydenhistory.co.uk

He has also appeared several times on Radio 4's Making History, and several appearances on TV such as BBC1 Heir Hunters, BBC1 Who Do You Think You Are? and recent programmes on the Blitz.

He is a member of Everton FC Heritage Society and writes history articles for the matchday programme and compiled a Remembrance booklet for the club on all players lost in both wars.

A book on the shipbuilding firm of Thomas Royden & Sons is due for publication early 2020.

He lives near Chester and has two sons, Lewis - a photographer, and Liam - a musician.
